Course Description

This course serves as an introduction to important areas of the study of language, namely morphology, syntax, and semantics/pragmatics. More specifically, it is aimed at providing students with some basic tools that they will need when they analyze various grammatical phenomena in language, which we will look at as a rule-governed system. The topics that we cover throughout the course include creativity, language change, inflection, derivation, constituent structure, recursivity in syntax, grammatical relations, simple versus complex clauses, semantic relations at the level of words and sentences, compositionality, thematic roles and conversational maxims. The course also provides a first introduction to argumentation in linguistics.
